

# ESCAPE ROOM 3: MURDER IN THE EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT! Teacher's guide

# **General information**

- **Topics covered:** EU institutions and their role.
- Age group: 13+
- **Timing:** Between 30 minutes and 1 hour
- **ER function:** This escape room can be used as a "practical exercise" after a theoretical lesson on these topics in class.
- Learning objectives: At the end of this ER, the pupils will be able to know:
  - ✓ EU institutions' logos and roles.
  - ✓ Some MEPs identity (with altered names), party/group and political position.
  - ✓ What a spitzenkandidat is.
- Note: This escape game may be complex as it requires investigation and deductive skills based on a consequent amount of information scattered across various documents. Some hints or guidance may be required, and the documents need to be placed properly to ensure that they will be consulted in the correct order.

# **Material**

In order to implement this escape room, you will need the following material:

# **Detailed scenario**

**Introduction:** The pupils are stuck in a room. The teacher or Game Master tells them:

"You are all detectives who have been hired by the Renew group to investigate the death of one of their members, Guy Greenhofstadt, a member of the European Parliament who was murdered on 9<sup>th</sup> May, during Europe Day in the Hemicycle building in Brussels.

You are now in Greenhofstadt's office, where you need to find clues and discover the culprit's identity and motive before their henchmen come to erase all the evidence from the victim's papers and computer. One fact you already know is that the criminal must be a part of an EU institution, as only official members have access to the location of the murder.

If you don't find the evidence soon, the person responsible for this death will get away with it. You need to provide proof that the suspect was present that day and had a reason to commit this crime. Be observant and efficient!"

**Step 1:** Clearly visible on a desk, the pupils will find a "priority" envelope which contains 2 elements. First, a letter written by Guy Greenhofstadt, the victim, in which he explained that he suspected someone wanted to kill him and established a list of potential suspects before his death (See **Annex 1**). Secondly, a set of 6 cards, each displaying information about an MEP, their party, position and experience, along with a logo of the EU institution they're a part of (See **Annex 2**). On each card, a letter is written in red, uppercase and bold, and when put together, the letters compose the word "EUROPE".

**Note:** The names of the MEPs have been altered in order not to directly associate a real political figure with such a crime. They are recognizable enough, and the information on the cards corresponds to the real politicians.

**Step 2:** On the same desk, under the envelope, are a few other documents: a list of EU institutions with their logo and a short explanation of their role (See **Annex 3**), a newspaper article mentioning that an altercation occurred on 5<sup>th</sup> May between Guy Greenhofstadt and another MEP whose name is scribbled out (See **Annex 4**) and a page of a weekly agenda displaying various meetings the victim had between 5<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> May (See **Annex 5**).

The agenda shows that Greenhofstadt had a meeting with 4 of the potential suspects on the day of the murder: Iratxe, Margrethe, Ulf and Charles. That indicates that they were all present that day in the building and that the 2 other suspects are most likely innocent.

**Step 3:** There is a laptop, computer or tablet with the "Guy Greenhofstadt's laptop" Genially on it, displaying various e-mails (See **Annex 6**). In order to unlock it, pupils must enter the password, which is "EUROPE" (all in capital letters). As a hint, the box in which the password should be typed says: "Find the 6 red clues", referring to the 6 red letters on the suspect cards.





**Step 4:** By analysing the contents of the Genially, pupils should be able to reduce the number of suspects thanks to these hints:

- The logos of various EU institutions are present on the cards and e-mails.
- There are 2 suspicious e-mails:
  - One in which the person asks to meet earlier than planned to discuss something they don't like, with the logo of the European Parliament.
  - One in which the person apologises for the altercation, with the logo of the European Commission.
- According to the suspect cards:
  - 2 suspects are part of the European Parliament: Iratxe and Jordan.
  - 2 suspects are part of the European Commission: Margrethe and Ursula.
- Among the 4 suspects that had a meeting with the victim on 8<sup>th</sup> May are Iratxe Garcia
   Diaz and Margrethe Vorsteiner, the final suspects.

**Step 5:** Once the pupils select those 2 names in the Genially, they are shown a newspaper article describing what a spitzenkandidat is and mentioning that two figures are battling to be the Renew lead candidate, Guy Greenhofstadt and another whose name is scribbled out. After having identified the last 2 suspects and by analysing their cards more closely, they should see that Margrethe Vorsteiner is also a part of the Renew group.

**Final step:** Once they identify her as the culprit, the Game Master or teacher asks them to explain the evidence they have and the reason why she killed Greenhofstadt.

They should point out the agenda proving that Margrethe was present that day to meet with the victim, the logo on her card matching the e-mail in which she apologises for the severe altercation they had, meaning she already had shown aggression towards the victim, and the fact that she had a motive because the victim was an obstacle on her way to becoming the Renew spitzenkandidat and possibly the president of the European Commission.

If they are able to explain the evidence and mention the motive or be guided towards it, the game ends as the Game Master or teacher says:

"Congratulations, you have found the criminal! Thanks to your help and the evidence you've gathered, the authorities will be able to arrest and condemn her, and the victim's family will receive justice! Good job! You can now leave the room."

# Tips and tricks

# **MATERIAL**

✓ Here is an example of what the envelope containing Annexes 1 and 2 could look like to make sure it is the first element that pupils interact with, considering it gives them vital information to start their investigation.







# **IMPLEMENTATION**

- ✓ As all of the steps occur around a small number of elements to interact with, you will not need a big room to implement this escape room. You may use only one side or corner of a classroom with a desk for the documents and screen.
- ✓ For the same reasons as above and considering that the steps must be followed in a specific order and cannot be done simultaneously, it may be best to play this escape room with a small group of students to avoid crowding or scattering their focus.
- ✓ If an hour passes and the students have not yet found the identity of the murderer, and if you don't wish to end the activity in a failure, you may decide to either give them more time or provide hints to help guide them.
- ✓ The post-scriptum of the Annex 1 letter mentions shapes (triangle, circle and square) and
  has been included as a false trail but can be used to create an additional step or riddle
  using those shapes as a hint or clue to find more information.
